The Pupil Premium is a source of funding made available to schools by the Government. This is targeted funding to be used to provide opportunities for disadvantaged pupils.

The national trend is that pupils who are eligible for free school meals have lower achievement than those who are not eligible. The Pupil Premium grant is to be used to help narrow this gap.

At Kea School, we believe that all pupils should be supported to achieve their potential. We are committed to using the resources made available to us to help achieve the best outcomes for all learners.

Curriculum focus of PPG spending 2022/23

- Ensuring Key Stage 1 pupils make at least expected progress in reading through weekly booster lessons with support staff
- Raising attainment in maths to ensure all pupils make at least expected progress
- Raising attainment in literacy to ensure all pupils make at least expected progress
- Provision of one to one and small group support in upper Key Stage 2 to ensure that majority of pupils reach expected levels in maths and English.
- Social and emotional skills support for children who experience difficulties in these areas to enable them to access learning effectively
- Financial support towards swimming for pupils in Y3, 4 and 5
- Access to residential visits for all, regardless of financial circumstances to ensure that all pupils make the most of educational opportunities on offer
- Access to wider opportunities (e.g. music lessons)
- Breakfast provided for children on occasions when they arrive at school hungry

Impact of PPG 2021/22

- There were no PP children in Y6 summer 2022. The percentages of PP funded pupils throughout the school working at expected standards were on average slightly lower that of non PP funded pupils: reading (71%), writing (71%) and maths (64%).
- ❖ Averaged across the school the percentage of PP children compared with non PP children working at greater depth was in line in maths (28%), above in writing (28%) and below for maths (14%).
- Progress (expected progress in one year is 6 points) of PP children on average was very good and higher than that of non PP children in reading (7.1pts) and writing (7.6pts) and slightly lower in maths (6 pts).
- ❖ Although interventions to support anxiety, emotional and social needs were timetabled throughout the year, high levels of staff absence through the year impacted negatively on the amount of progress they made. This needs to continue in the 2022/23 academic year.
- All Y4, 5 and 6 pupils who wanted to go on their class residential visit attended.
